Raana Horan and Klem Christiansen had the Haeusler's Mallee Rally ARB 400 victory within grasp when three corners from the finish line, Danny Brown and George Apted dove the #42 Jimco hard into the corner, sneaking passed Horan to greet the checkered flag and claim his first Haeusler's Mallee Rally ARB 400 title.

After rolling in prologue, Aaron Haby came back fighting, slotting the Element Prodigy into third place rounding out the Haeusler's Mallee Rally ARB 400 podium.

Liz Haby navigated for the first two laps, however, illness prevented her from continuing; Andy Ryan, now in the pits after engine failure in the #50 Alumi Craft ended his weekend, jumped into the navigator's seat to guide Aaron to the finish line.

One of the Mallee's most well-known favourite sons, Stuart McLean, was awarded an OAM in the 2017 Queen's Birthday Honours.

The award 'For service to the community and to local government' is well-deserved as the list of service below indicates.

Stuart and Nuccia now reside in Hamlyn Heights near Geelong, and Stuart has shown no sign of slowing down since retiring from farming at Wycheproof.

He commenced his passion of community service at the age of 16 as secretary of the Berriwillock Tennis Club and then became involved with the Victorian Young Farmers.

After moving to Wycheproof, Stuart joined the Lions Club and things snowballed from there.

Stuart's first reaction was "Who the b... hell nominated me?"

A humble man, Stuart says you don't get these awards without the help of all those you work with.

"You can sit on a committee and be a knife and fork member, or you can make a real difference," he said.

The Governor-General, Sir Peter Cosgrove, offered his deepest congratulations, admiration and respect for the contribution made by this year's award recipients.

"We are fortunate as a community to have so many outstanding people willing to dedicate themselves to the betterment of our nation and it is only fitting that they have today been recognised through the Australian Honours system," he said.

Included in The Queen's Birthday Honours List are 673 recipients of awards in the General Division of the Order of Australia who have been recognised for contributions and service to fellow citizens in Australia and internationally.

Telehealth Support for People in the Wimmera, Mallee, Mildura Region

People seeking psychological services in the Wimmera, Mallee, Mildura region will be able to claim a Medicare rebate for online videoconferencing consultations from November 1, 2017.

As part of the Federal Government's commitment to bridging the city-country divide in providing access to health services, \$9 million will be dedicated to the service over the next four years.

The rebate will allow for consultations with medical professionals who may be hundreds of kilometres away, eliminating the inconvenience, time and expense of travel for many regional patients.

Member for Mallee, Andrew Broad, has highlighted the hardship regional people experience in seeking treatment in remote areas; he says this commitment by the government is much needed.

"The demand for these services in the Wimmera, Mallee, Mildura region is great and it's only getting greater, and some small towns in our patch don't have a local psychologist or other health professional available," he said.

"With thanks to telehealth technology, regional people will be able to have an appointment with a health professional without travelling a great distance."

Up to seven of the ten sessions currently available under Medicare rebate mental health plans will be available via telehealth.

Mr Broad said compared to urban counterparts, there is a big reduction in access to health care in regional Australia.

More Small Businesses Can Claim \$20,000 Instant Tax Write-Offs

Even more small businesses across the Wimmera, Mallee, Mildura region will reap the benefits of the instant asset write-off, after the scheme was extended for another year.

This means local small businesses with an annual turnover of up to \$10 million a year are able to write-off any approved asset they buy for their business up to the value of \$20,000.

Federal Member for Mallee Andrew Broad has welcomed the new measure.

"If you are buying something for \$20,000 or less, you can deduct that from your taxable income instantly – it works really well," he said.

"The beauty about it is that not only does it help the 17,000 small businesses that function in the Mallee, but it really helps the local commu-

nity, because the things you buy are pipes, sheds, tanks, utes, computer equipment – the sorts of things that are sold in small businesses across the country."

The measure was introduced in 2015, but will now be available to an additional 90,000 businesses after the Federal Government redefined small business as those with a turnover of up to \$10 million a year up from those with a turnover of \$2 million.

The scheme has also been strongly supported by the National Farmers' Federation, with more farmers now able to invest in tools and equipment required without being out of pocket.

The measure will further support small businesses right across the Wimmera, Mallee, Mildura region with the extension set to run until June 30, 2018.

Thousands Missing Out on Cancer Trials

Thousands of Victorian cancer patients are missing out on potentially life-prolonging treatment as clinical trial participation rates stagnate.

Only about six percent of Victorians with a cancer diagnosis have been recruited to a clinical trial and rates have remained static for more than a decade.

Cancer Council Victoria CEO, Todd Harper, said the results of clinical trials have proved crucial in improving survival rates and quality of life for people with cancer.

"Without participants, researchers cannot make these breakthroughs," he said.

"Despite the number of trials increasing across the state, more people with cancer are needed to participate in clinical trials.

"Every advance in cancer care has been the result of people putting their hands up to take part in a clinical trial and help improve outcomes not just for the patients of today but for those in the future."

To recognise International Clinical Trials Day on May 20, Mr Harper said it was important to bust some of the myths that could be deterring

people from joining a clinical trial.

One misperception is that trials are risky but he stressed that all test treatments go through a rigorous testing program before being used on patients and that trials available in Victorian hospitals are overseen by Human Research Ethics Committees.

"We understand that there may be concerns around risk but clinical trials are conducted under strict ethical guidelines to ensure the treatments offered are as safe as possible," he said.

"These trials are vital to better understand, diagnose, prevent and treat diseases. They are a gold standard treatment option."

Mr Harper said many patients are concerned about the randomisation process and not receiving the test treatment, but this is exactly why the clinical trials are being undertaken.

"We don't know if the new test treatment is better than the standard treatment," he said.

"Some studies even show that patients in clinical trials have better outcomes than those that aren't."

If people are concerned or

have questions about participating in a trial they can call Cancer Council's 131 120 cancer information and support nurses. Cancer Council also has a peer support team who can link people affected by cancer with trained peers who have been through a clinical trial to discuss what to expect.

In 2015, just over 2,000 people with cancer were recruited into a cancer clinical trial and there were almost 500 trials open at different sites across Victoria.

To assist people with cancer and their families in accessing trials, Cancer Council Victoria has enhanced its Victorian Cancer Trials Link (VCTL) website.

The site is now a user-friendly portal that allows people to search every treatment trial across the state, including those run out of rural and regional hospitals.

Mr Harper said he would encourage any patient, carer, family member or friend of someone diagnosed with cancer to jump on the VCTL site and see what trials are available in their area.

"It could make all the difference," he said.

Cracking Down on Illegal Guns

A new team of police investigators will target fire-arm crime across Victoria as part of the Andrews Labor Government's crack-down to remove illegal guns from the streets and keep the community safe.

Minister for Police Lisa Neville joined Assistant Commissioner Steve Fontana to unveil the new team – the latest tool in the war on the illicit firearms trade and armed crime.

The 10 new officers were funded as part of the Victorian Budget 2016/17 and will work in two teams of five.

The new teams are part of Victoria Police's Armed Crime Squad, and will run overt and covert firearms operations across Victoria. The first officers in these teams have already hit the streets in the last few weeks.

They will work to disrupt the illicit firearms trade, focusing on high-risk offenders who may be involved in gun crime.

The team will also closely scrutinise trends in the illegal manufacture of firearms – including the use of 3D printers – and will provide support to the regions to investigate thefts of registered firearms.

This investment will also support stronger collaboration between Victoria Police, interstate and Common-

wealth agencies to help stop trafficking of illegal firearms into the state.

The recent announcement comes as the Labor Government prepares to introduce new laws into parliament to better address the illegal manufacture of firearms by making it an offence to possess firearm parts or equipment to create a firearm.

There will be additional laws introduced to specifically address drive-by shootings and people who shoot at buildings, as well as a new Firearms Prohibition Order that will give police the power to target individuals who pose a threat or risk to public safety from accessing firearms.

The Labor Government has created a range of new offences to tackle the black market in guns, which came into effect in late 2015. These included creating a new offence 'manufacture of firearms', including using 3D printers to create guns, which carries a maximum penalty of 10 years jail.

These changes have also made it easier for the police to charge individuals for the possession of a firearm, as well as increasing the penalty for the theft of a firearm from 10 to 15 years in jail.

Victoria Police is recruiting thousands of extra po-

lice to bolster the front line and keep Victorians safe, with 3,135 new police to be deployed over the next five years.

Minister for Police Lisa Neville said they're stepping up the fight on illegal firearms to keep Victorians safe.

"The dedicated new team of specially recruited and trained officers will be at the front line to stop the trade of illicit guns, which has no place in our society," he said.

"Our record police investment is putting thousands of police into the communities across Victoria, while also delivering the specialist police to take on the illicit gun trade, gangs and maintain public order."

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Woomelang Primary Explores the Great Outdoors

The Mallee Catchment Management Authority (CMA) and students from Woomelang spent time at Cronomby Tanks, exploring the area and collecting scientific data and the report is in – it's a very healthy wetland.

Ms Susan Saris, from the Mallee CMA said the students were very enthusiastic and joined in on lively discussions about the importance of a healthy environment.

"We started the day with students using binoculars to find birds living in the wetland, before we moved on to microscopes, so that they could investigate the tiny water bugs that also live in the wetland."

The keen, young eyes proved to be quite an as-

set in the data collection, with birds including herons and sandpipers spotted in the trees and boatmen, shrimp and mites found in the water samples.

"All the students were keen to participate and enjoyed learning more about the life and food cycles in the wetland," Ms Saris said.

In a sign of the times, binoculars were soon set aside as new age technology took over, with students using hand-held GPS devices to help them to take photos that aligned with those taken in previous years' monitoring.

"This is an important part of the monitoring, by comparing photos taken in the same location, over a number of years, we can determine noticeable differences in the vegetation.

"It was great to see that native seedlings that were planted at the site

by Friends of Cronomby Tanks have progressed well."

The data collected by the students will be used by the Mallee CMA to measure and monitor the benefits of watering that takes place in the Cronomby Tanks area and to keep a record of changes over an extended period of time.

It wasn't all hard work for the students though, with the day wrapping up with a presentation by Sarah Holmes from EnviroEdu.

With her pet bearded dragon, sand goanna, pythons, turtle and possum, Ms Holmes had the children enthralled as they learnt about the threat to our native species from feral animals and habitat loss.

Many things have changed in the lives of children but one thing still remains – the wide-eyed awe with which they look at a python.

A National Framework to See Australia-Wide Intervention Orders to be Put in Place

Federal Member for Mallee Andrew Broad has followed through with his commitment to reduce family violence offences in the Wimmera Mallee and Mildura region addressing Parliament on progress made with Australia-wide Intervention Orders.

All Federal, State and Territory Justice Ministers have agreed on a National framework that will allow for domestic violence orders issued in one state to be recognised and enforceable in any jurisdiction.

On top of this, a system called CrimTrac is also being set up – this will allow police all over Australia to identify if a person has an Intervention Order issued against them before intervening.

Mr Broad says he is pleased to see the Government is taking the

necessary steps to combat family violence.

"There is more to be done and it will be a long fight, but to see the Government being proactive against family violence gives me great hope," he said.

Mr Broad was the first to raise the prospect of Australia-wide Intervention Orders after learning those with an Apprehended Violence Order could cross the Murray River and the AVO was no longer binding.

"We're working towards stamping out family violence issues in the Wimmera, Mallee and Mildura region all together and Australia-wide Intervention Orders are an absolute necessity to this," he said.

"We have to work to protect family violence victims and to teach the youth of today the respect our family and loved ones deserve."

Sheepmeat Industry Backs Changes to the LPA Program

Sheepmeat Council of Australia (SCA) is supporting changes to the Livestock Production Assurance (LPA) program.

SCA President Jeff Murray said the upgrades will serve to strengthen LPA for the betterment of the sheepmeat industry by ensuring Australia builds on its global reputation as a world leader in food safety, integrity and traceability.

"The industry must continue to work hard

to ensure Australia's red meat production is reinforced by an integrity system that delivers product to customers that meets and exceeds their expectations. The system also allows Australia to maintain its enviable access to new and existing markets, both at home and internationally," Mr

Murray said

"Customers demand a high quality product that is safe and ethically produced. The sheepmeat industry is committed to continual improvement of the integrity system to underpin that claim and grow the sustainability and prosperity of Australian sheepmeat producers.

"SCA is confident that the changes to the LPA program will build our integrity credentials and allow producers to stand by what they sell."

The upgrades to the LPA program will launch on October 1 and include:

- On-farm biosecurity and animal welfare practices to be included in the LPA program
- LPA accredited producers will need to complete a regular assessment

• As part of a new secure funding model, producers will pay \$60 (+GST) for LPA accreditation every three years

• New online learning modules to upskill producers (LPA Learning)

• Further rollout of free electronic National Vendor Declarations (eNVD)

SCA CEO Dr Kat Giles said the changes will ensure Australia remains a world leader in red meat safety and traceability.

"Meeting the requirements of the LPA program will continue to provide livestock producers with a competitive advantage and the best opportunity to sell their livestock for the highest possible price in the greatest number of markets.

"A suite of tools and information will be provided to producers between now and October 1 to make the changes as easy as possible.

"SCA, through our Food Safety and Integrity Systems and Animal Health and Welfare Committees worked in close consultation with the Integrity Systems Company and the wider red meat industry on the development and implementation of these changes and to ensure they align with the needs of the red meat industry."

Producers can access background information on the red meat integrity system at the Integrity Hub, <http://www.mla.com.au/integrity>. It includes information on the LPA program, the National Livestock Identification System, LPA Learning and producer resources.

BCG Expo Examines Innovative Approaches to Succession Planning

They say "never go into business with family or friends" however, this is a natural event in family farming businesses and the agricultural industry.

At BCG's Future Farmers Expo on July 5, the topic of integrating new family members, harnessing their skills, getting the right business structure and succession planning will be discussed in a panel session, giving attendees the chance to hear from three farming families that have successfully navigated the sometimes stressful subject.

Succession planning has commonly been a topic avoided at the family dinner table and often left up to financial advi-

sors, accountants, solicitors and lawyers. However, there's also many successful cases of families tackling the issue head on which has led to long-term business success and contented families.

The two fundamental principles of succession planning is to ensure that the family remains a family, and the business continues to survive or moves in a direction where all parties are in agreement. These principles are based on a foundation of open and clear communication between all parties involved.

An innovative approach to succession has enabled the Cain family from Natte Yallock and Kaye family from Elm-

hurst to provide an avenue for children and partners to enter the business and provide new skills.

The Cain family brand 'Dad's Oats' was not only a chance for two siblings working off-farm to participate in the family business, but also an avenue to showcase their primary product (oats) produced by their parents Maurice and Ruth, and brother Matt to create industry awareness, spread business risk and bring in another avenue of income.

The Kaye's, farmers at Nowhere Creek near Avoca, have also adapted their business to increase capacity to support their growing family, with the food tourism venture 'Settler and Sons'.

Kirby Kaye will share the intimate story of marrying into a family farm, the challenges it brings but how bringing a new set of skills to the business allow it grow in a way where the family hosts events and provides accommodation on-farm.

Matt Cain will present their family's story at the Future Farmers Expo to give us an insight into the issues faced by the family along the journey, and how overcoming them as a family has assisted in the successful transition allowing a new generation to come.

Karen Inkster, a partner in the Aubrey and Areegra venture based around Warracknabeal, will share her story about joining a family farm, again bringing in a new skills set such as marketing and advertising to the family business but also helping out other small businesses in the area.

Peak Livestock Body Opens Council Election Process

Farmers with passion and vision are being encouraged to put their hands up for a chance to lead the livestock industry.

The Victorian Farmers Federation Livestock Group has called for nominations to stand for election to its policy council – in the Goulburn Broken, West Gippsland, Glenelg, North Central and Mallee regions.

Natural Alternatives for Safe Pain Relief

Whether it's the discomfort of a nagging headache or the continual whining of a young one suffering the discomfort and pain of teething or colic, pain can make our lives sheer misery.

The following natural remedies are safe, mild treatments for the relief of pain, and are also suitable for children.

When an earache is the problem, heat two cloves of chopped garlic in two teaspoons of olive oil. Strain the oil and then insert a few lukewarm drops in the offending ear, plugging the outer ear with cottonwool. If pain persists, consult your health practitioner.

For temporary relief of toothache, apply a crushed clove or oil of cloves to the painful tooth, or plug the cavity with cottonwool soaked in clove oil. Persistent toothache needs the prompt attention of a dentist.

Young ones suffering from mild colic and wind are a common problem. Give them one teaspoon of chamomile tea, with

powdered ginger to taste, frequently. When they are teething, rub aloe vera gel, available from health food stores, as a stabilised liquid, on the gums.

To help ease muscular cramps, drink the following tea whenever needed. Combine one teaspoon of cinnamon, half-a-teaspoon of cardamom and a quarter of a teaspoon of nutmeg. Thoroughly mix all powdered ingredients in one cup of boiling water, cover, infuse for five minutes and sip while warm, or take by the teaspoon.

When muscular aches and pain is a problem, soak in a hot bath in which half a cup of bicarbonate soda has been dissolved. Then blend together three drops each of eucalyptus and lavender oil with one tablespoon of almond oil and massage well into the afflicted area.

For general headaches which are caused for no apparent reason, put one drop of lavender oil on each of your index fingertips and massage around

the temples and the base of the skull, and along the hair line. Tension headaches can be relieved by putting a few drops of lavender oil in a bowl of warm water, then wringing out a handkerchief in it and applying to the back of the neck while you lay back and relax.

The herb feverfew (Tanacetum parthenium) is an extremely good preventive for migraine headaches. Eat three leaves daily of the fresh herb in a sandwich, or take feverfew capsules from your health food store, or drink as a tea.

To make feverfew tea, put one tablespoon of fresh leaves or one teaspoon of dried leaves in a ceramic cup and fill with boiling water. Cover, infuse for three minutes and strain. Sweeten with a little honey if required. Drink half a cup of feverfew tea every hour at the first sign of migraine attack or tension, or drink one cup of the tea every morning as a preventive measure.

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Modern Fire Services for a Safer Victoria

The CFA will be a volunteer-only firefighting service and the role of volunteers further enshrined under law, while a new organisation, Fire Rescue Victoria, will be established to fight fires in Melbourne and major regional centres, in much-needed and overdue reforms to the state's fire services that will keep Victorians safe.

Victoria has some of the best firefighters in the world, but they currently operate under systems and structures that have not changed since the 1950s.

In just the last decade, eight reviews have been undertaken into Victoria's fire services, including the Victorian Bush-

fires Royal Commission. They have made it clear that the state's services are in need of modernisation.

The Labor Government's changes, outlined as part of the Fire Services Statement, will respond to these issues, and ensure Victorians can rely on modern and local fire services to keep them safe, regardless of where they live.

Under the reforms, the CFA will be further protected under law as a volunteer service and the 1,220 CFA brigades will continue to serve their communities as they have always done, as well as providing vital surge capacity during major emergencies.

Importantly, CFA vol-

unteers currently serving at one of the state's 35 integrated stations will be able to remain at that station, co-locating with Fire Rescue Victoria services.

Additionally, the Labor Government will make sure CFA volunteers have the equipment and support they need, with a dedicated \$56.2 million CFA Support Fund to strengthen volunteer recruitment, training, brigade support and leadership.

The new Fire Rescue Victoria will be established to fight fires in major regional cities and Melbourne, bringing together the MFB and career staff from the state's

35 integrated CFA stations, including the 450 extra career firefighters currently being delivered.

Fire Rescue Victoria will be based on other successful police and emergency services organisations, including the model in New South Wales and be led by its own Commissioner.

Consistent with Recommendation 63 of the Victorian Bushfires Royal Commission, an independent Fire District Review Panel, will also be established. The Panel will conduct future reviews of the boundary between fire services, based on population growth, urban development and the volume of

Triple 000 calls.

Victoria's emergency services will also have the very best facilities and equipment, with the establishment of a new Emergency Services Infrastructure Authority. One of the first tasks for the new authority will be to work with the CFA on delivering a new \$44 million station building program.

The reforms include driving cultural change, including an ambitious target to quadruple the number of career female firefighters in the fire services from 100 to 400, within four years. The number of women will be increased in CFA brigade leadership roles from 265

to 909 over the same period.

To roll out these reforms, an Operational Implementation Committee will be established and chaired by Greg Mullins AFSM, former Commissioner of Fire and Rescue NSW.

Fire and rescue services will continue as normal, and the amount collected through the Fire Services Property Levy will not change over the next two years while the reforms are implemented.

Premier Daniel Andrews said they've had eight reviews in the past ten years.

"All of them have reached the same conclusion – the current fire

services structure isn't working," he said.

"We are taking action to protect CFA volunteers, modernise our fire services and, most importantly, keep Victorians safe, wherever they live."

Deputy Premier and Minister for Emergency Services, James Merlino, said they'll enshrine the CFA as a volunteer firefighting service under law and unite the career firefighters under one organisation.

"We will also drive cultural change – with real and ambitious targets to increase the number of female firefighters in our fire services, particularly in leadership roles," he said.

Helping Households Most in Need Reduce their Energy Costs

The Andrews Labor Government is delivering \$17 million to reduce energy costs for households that need it most.

The Home Energy Assist program, which provides funding for more than 3,300 Victorian homes to become more energy efficient, has had its funding increased by an additional \$8.1 million allocated in the Victorian Budget 2017/18.

The Home Energy Assist package now includes:

- \$6.5 million for the Victorian Healthy Homes Program, to upgrade the homes of 1,000 vulnerable Victorians with complex healthcare needs and low incomes.

- \$4.3 million for the EnergySmart Public Housing Program, which will replace inefficient electric water heaters and electric heaters in 1,300 public housing proper-

ties and deliver tailored upgrades to a further 200 from July 1, 2017.

- \$6.1 million as part of an Affordable Retrofits Program to support more than 800 Victorian concession card holders with home energy retrofits, appliance replacements, solar panels and energy literacy programs.

In addition, the Labor Government will also spend \$1 million to update the Victorian Energy Compare website <https://compare.switchon.vic.gov.au/> to include cost-reflective and other innovative tariffs, to ensure that the website can respond to the introduction of new tariffs by energy retailers.

The EnergySmart Public Housing Program is in addition to the Government's \$185 million program to redevelop over 11,000 public housing homes to ensure they are better suited to Victorians needs.

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NULLAWIL LOCAL NEWS AND SPORT

Wintry conditions have continued with frosty mornings, days of sunshine and icy nights. Hours of daylight are decreasing as the winter solstice draws near.

After an ideal start to the cropping season, weather forecasting models are still suggesting drier to average conditions over the next three months, but have backed off predictions for an El Nino. The near full soil moisture profile is a good insurance policy if the forecast drier conditions do eventuate.

The drawn out sowing season continues for many in the area as the last of the crop goes in. Rain interrupted seeding on May 18 and growers have been struggling to get back on paddocks since. There has been plenty of 'stubble trouble' for those who have recommenced. Thick, wet stubbles are proving a challenge to get through. Burning and prickle churning before or after sowing are being used to deal with the stubble. Effectiveness of pre-emergence herbicides applied to the soil for weed con-

trol is also being compromised due to the high stubble load. And there are plenty of interruptions to unblock mud from airseeder hoses.

This year 'sowing is so much more than just sowing', with 'machinery overload' in paddocks as the process takes place. One local farmer battling a thick, high, wet stubble paddock last week had fire harrows burning stubble, prickle chain flattening stubble and spray unit ready for pre-emergent spraying for weed control. That all takes place before sowing with the airseeder, followed by mice baiting, and in the case of legumes, rolling to flatten ground for ease of harvesting.

As the optimum sowing window comes to an end, farmers are being advised to consider 'shorter growing season' cereal varieties as they finish off cropping programs. Peas are being sown in the area.

Spraying of weeds in the dry sown and early sown crops is being hindered by frosty conditions. Crop growth has slowed with frosty morn-

ings, decreasing hours of sunshine, and reduced ground temperatures.

Mice are still causing damage in crops and farmers are still baiting or rebaiting where bait is available. Mice appear to be stockpiling grain.

Farmers are being advised to monitor crops for disease over the coming weeks with the increased moisture putting crops at higher risk.

Following on from their visit to the 'Spanner Man' at Barraport last week, students have been inspired to hold a 'sculpture celebration project'. The theme of the project is 'Life in Nully' and sculptures will be displayed along the school walking track to add interest to the developing native area. The sculptures must be made of metal or a durable material and entries close on October 20 ready for unveiling and display at the School Fete on October 26.

Students from Ultima PS and St. Mary's Sea Lake will be joining Nullawil primary students on an excursion to the Cokum Reserve on Thursday. Susan Saris from the Mallee Catchment Management Authority in Mildura will have students engaging in activities such as bird surveys and looking for bugs as part of the Mallee CMA Tyrrell Project.

Winter Warning to Country Drivers

A burst of wintry weather has prompted the Transport Accident Commission to call on country drivers to slow down and adapt to more hazardous conditions.

TAC road safety director Samantha Cockfield said wintry conditions magnified the dangers of driving on country roads.

"Speed and fatigue are common factors in re-

gional road fatalities at any time of year," she said.

"Slowing down, staying alert and driving to the conditions becomes even more important when weather and road conditions are poor."

Black ice, fog, mist, rain, wind and land slips are all potential hazards during winter months, even when driving cautiously on the best country Victorian roads.

Ms Cockfield said motorists could also prevent a tragedy by making safe choices when driving.

"Reducing speed, allowing a safe distance between you and the vehicle in front and eliminating distractions are all key safety tips to remember," she said.

"Instead of taking the back roads to save five minutes, sticking to the main roads and highways can help ensure you get to your destination safely."

Ms Cockfield said vehicle safety also played a pivotal role in reducing road trauma, and driving safe vehicles during winter was paramount.

"Make sure your tyres and brakes are in good condition, ensure all lights are working and use headlights in low visibility," she said.

Five tips for safe winter driving:

1. Ensure tyres are in good condition;
2. Get plenty of rest before your journey;
3. Brake gently;
4. Turn your lights on, even during the day; and
5. Reduce your speed in fog, mist or slippery conditions.
